From Pastor Steve

I woke to the news of the death of Pope Francis the morning after Easter Sunday. I was not surprised. He had been battling health issues for quite some time. I was amazed though that he had been fulfilling his duties and working right up until the end. Francis was a very dedicated man and we Lutherans mourn the loss along with our Catholic brothers and sisters.

I always find it sad when the world loses people that have done so much good and have such a high profile. I remember being equally as sad about President Jimmy Carter when he passed on earlier this year. God raises up these good people and uses their gifts to show the rest of us what it truly means to live a Christ like life. God also uses them as an example of what we should expect from the people we pick to lead us.

Right now, our faith in leadership is on shaky ground. The world over we are seeing the more extreme ends of the social and political spectrum vying for power and trying to convince us that their vision is the correct one. I think what these strong personalities fail to understand is that to lead is to do so for all people. You don't get to exact revenge on those who you feel wronged you and only do things to keep your supporters cheering for you.

I am particularly concerned with the treatment lately by our leaders of people who are in our country from other places. While I believe in secure borders and proper vetting of those seeking to immigrate here, I do not agree with the complicated and expensive processes we have that creates barriers to citizenship instead of helping people obtain it. I have close friends and colleagues that would love to be here as legally as possible, but they constantly find themselves up against a system that seems to want to make it as difficult as possible for them.

What is even more difficult for them is that they are being told their work or school status could be terminated at any time, and people could come to take them into custody. These are friends, neighbors, and people I care very much about, and I feel awful when they ask me for advice. I have to tell them things like they shouldn't leave the country to go home and visit family or to take care of things they need to be in person for. They should scrub or delete all their social media in fear that they may have posted something critical that can be used against them. I don't feel good about advising people I know to be good and decent that they need to have their immigration papers on them at all times, and to immediately contact my wife or I in case their kids all the sudden need a place to stay because mom or dad is being detained. These are all real conversations I've had in recent weeks.

This weighs heavy on my mind in the wake of the death of Pope Francis because he was a champion for the poor, oppressed, and the refugees among us. I know that didn't always sit well with people, but he was speaking to the teachings of Jesus Christ who laid all of this out for us. Jesus had to flee his own home to Egypt because of a king who wanted him and his family dead. When he began his ministry, he was some nobody from a low class town called Nazareth and people looked down on him because of his status and upbringing. Jesus ministered to the untouchables of society like lepers, and tax collectors and Samaritans who were especially hated because they intermarried with other cultures. Jesus went to the people nobody else would because they were worth it, and they mattered.

Pope Francis once said "It's hypocrisy to call yourself a Christian and chase away a refugee or someone seeking help, someone who is hungry or thirsty, toss out someone who is in need of my help. If I say I am Christian, but do these things, I'm a hypocrite."

Jesus warned us to not be like the hypocrites who preach and pray on the street corners to be seen but then do not live it out in our daily lives. This is a time when the people of God need to be ready to aid those who feel like they have no power. I would encourage you to support local organizations like Global Friends Coalition, Lutheran Social Services, Global Refuge (LIRS) and other entities that support our immigrant and refugee communities. These organizations provide housing assistance, support for paths to citizenship, education, and legal services.

Most of our immigrant and refugee communities just want to live in peace and share in the promise of Life, Liberty, and Happiness that our country offers. Too many good people are getting caught up in the fear and hatred that are being unjustly thrown their way. I know this feels like a big ask, but we must lead with empathy and compassion first, so that everyone, no matter who they are or where they come from, can share in the promise of new life this Easter season. Amen.

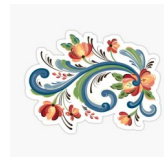
